Everence

Elsa Jewell of Shalom Church in Spokane, WA has received a \$500 scholarship to pursue a degree at Spokane Falls Community College. Jewell is among 42 recipients. The program encourages young people to **explore the integration of faith and finances** while helping them on their educational journeys. Recipients were chosen based on academics, extracurricular activities, leadership, community involvement and responses to an essay question. Students wrote essays about someone who models the concept of stewardship. "We were encouraged to see that so many students have people in their lives who set an example of how to be good stewards of their time and resources," said Phyllis Mishler, member benefits manager for Everence. "They're learning important lessons about how much impact a spirit of generosity can have."



Goshen College

Brian O' Leary, of Seattle Mennonite Church, reflects on his summer experience:

When I made the decision to participate in Goshen's Camping Inquiry Program (CIP), I wasn't sure where I wanted to take my experience. It became a choice between Amigo Centre in Michigan or a combination of Drift Creek Camp and Camp CAMREC in Oregon and Washington. I had never worked at Amigo Centre before so I was tempted by the new experience. But in the end, the temperate rainforest of Drift Creek and the mountainous region of CAMREC influenced my decision in a westerly direction.

There is something about these camps and this region which draws me here. Drift Creek is located near the coast within a damp, rainforest climate; whereas CAMREC resides in the mountains where temperatures range from eighty-five degrees into the triple digits and five minute rain storms are followed by cloudless afternoons. Drift Creek is larger and more structured, it seems that Oregon camping people tend to build bigger, housing summer camps of up to ninety-four campers. CAMREC, on the other hand, had a big year with twenty-five campers. Each unique program had something valuable to offer. Drift Creek provided more organized camp time. Activities required forethought and planning in order to keep ninety campers entertained. As a counterpoint CAMREC is more free-flowing with room for spontaneity.

This dichotomy of the way each program functions brings me to what I will take back to Goshen, *cooperation*. Drift Creek and CAMREC are both blessed by being supported by a great conference and each being located in a wonderfully unique area. Yet while the camps are different, it was great to see how the two programs cooperate in order to help the development of young kids. Sending kids from Washington down to Drift Creek in order to experience a new, larger camp setting is just as important as sending kids from Oregon up to Washington to experience slowing camp life down and taking things as they come. I have found this summer incredibly valuable to my growth as a human being as well as to my unexpected development of an understanding regarding cooperation, a theme I had not expected to develop in such different camp settings.
