About 70 church leaders from across Mennonite Church USA gathered at Camp Hebron March 11-13. It was the convening of the Constituency Leaders Council (CLC) and Katherine Jameson Pitts, Jennifer Sololano and I represented PNMC. Iris de Leon Hartshorn was also present as MC USA staff. As our conference resource advocate, Charlotte Derkson joined the first morning. CLC is sometimes referred to as the "elders of MC USA," providing guidance to the work of the denomination but holding no decision-making power. At these meetings the worship is lively and the agenda is full with many issues brought for discussion. This meeting dealt with polity issues and preparation for Phoenix 2013. Reports of the CLC meeting will likely appear in the wider church press. Those of us who were present are also available to give more information on the items discussed.

The gathering concluded with a communion service. We stood in a large circle as leader, Elizabeth Soto Albrecht, reminded us that we are Christ's body and our labor is that of Christ's body. She reminded us that Christ's Spirit in us, and among us, is the One who takes our efforts and brings them alive. As the cup and the bread nourished our body, we said good-bye to one another and headed home. Being a body takes effort and I left feeling exhausted. But deeper than exhaustion, I felt wonderfully blessed to have worshiped and deliberated with those committed to Christ and his church!

Anabaptist Biblical Mennonite Seminary

A new Master of Divinity program will begin at AMBS in August and will provide options to study locally or from a distance. MDiv Connect, the distance option, includes online learning and brief visits to campus.

MDiv Campus, for residential students, adds community living practices to the long-standing strengths of AMBS's program. AMBS is eager to provide resources to new students who previously would not have been able to participate. Also, former students who discontinued seminary may find the new distance option an opportunity to complete their studies. Program overview.

Mennonite Disaster Service

MDS is tackling the rebuilding lives in Crisfield, Maryland. In addition to the labor volunteers provide gutting and repairing homes, they also strive to give hope to survivors. Crisfield, with a staggering unemployment rate of more than 90%, is located in one of the poorest parts of the state. Even with MDS assistance, uncertainty about the future reigns in this maritime town, which was built on oystering. In its heyday, Crisfield's population rose to 24,000. In 1904, it was Maryland's second largest city, after Baltimore. Today it has 2,700 inhabitants. After oysters succumbed to overfishing and disease in the 1920s, blue crabs replaced them as the area's cash crop. Crisfield thrived on crabbing until pollution and overharvesting took their toll in the early 1990s. No major economic activity replaced shellfish, and Crisfield struggles to survive. Although oyster and crab populations are reviving, few people can make a livelihood solely on the water. Residents with skills and education seek employment elsewhere. Those who leave Crisfield leave behind the neediest and most vulnerable, including the elderly. Ken Wermuth, a contractor from Glen Allen, VA, has been serving as MDS project manager there since mid-January. He anticipates that work will continue into 2014. *Visit unw.mds.mennonite.net for details*.

Mennonite Education Agency



After six years as its chair, James L. Rosenberger will step down and Malinda Berry has been appointed as chair-elect. Berry, an alum of Bethany Christian Schools, Goshen College and AMBS, is an instructor in theological studies and director of the master's program at Bethany Theological Seminary in Richmond, IN. "As my time on the MEA Board is coming to an end," said Rosenberger, "I'm heartened that one of our youngest board members has been selected. Malinda has a broad understanding of Mennonite education, is currently engaged in Anabaptist theological education, and brings a thoughtful approach to understanding how MEA can provide value to the educational mission of the church." Berry added, "If there is one thing my time on the Board has shown me, it is that the role our educational institutions play in the daily lives of U.S. Mennonites keeps changing. None of us can conduct

business as our forerunners did. We are in a time when the task of MEA's staff, board and affiliated institutions is to offer *everyone* (including 'our' young people) a chance to encounter the Christian gospel mediated by the dynamic intellectual life of Anabaptism."
