Salem 2011 Report

I sometimes tell people that I'm a bit strange ... I like going to annual conference meetings. The truth is that most who attend Annual Meeting are there because they enjoy it. For many in our churches, attending conference is not possible due to schedules and work. For others, there is just not the interest. "Conference? What's that?"

My answer is that conference Annual Meeting is the chance to meet together with other churches that hold to an Anabaptist view of Christian faith and practice. With thirty-eight congregations represented, there is the opportunity to network, visit, worship, learn and reconnect.

This year the meeting was held at Western Mennonite School near Salem, Oregon. The theme was "Discerning in Community" and the majority of scheduled time focused on exploring the topic of discernment. The book of Philippians provided biblical material for exploring this theme. Robert "Jack" Suderman, former General Secretary of Mennonite Church Canada, led the assembly through sessions on Paul's letter to the Philippians. He likened our exploration to that of a pleasant stroll through a rose garden.

Along with scholarly insights into the meaning of Paul's words, Jack related to stories from his years of teaching in Colombia and Cuba. He shared one Colombian saying which stays in my mind: "If you don't know where you've been or where you are going, then any bus will do." Such folk wisdom, as well as scripture and story, spoke to the broader theme of discerning the church's direction together.

We also looked at Philippians through the scripture reading style of *Dwelling in the Word* (also known as lectio divina). Craig Morton, co-pastor of Emmaus Church, lead the group on Friday and Saturday mornings. Table groups listened to the scripture reading (Philippians 3:7-21) and simply shared a phrase, thought or word that came to mind as the scripture was read. The style and practice required a contemplative frame of mind, focus and reflective listening.

Another way the discernment theme was explored was through a morning session led by the Faith and Practice Team. See Cathleen Hockman-Wert's article on page 3 for a full description.



Business was discussed and the ballot and budget approved. Finances were slightly in deficit, though generally sound. We gave our blessings to Iris de León-Hartshorn as she leaves the Executive Conference Minister position and we welcomed Dave Stutzman as he takes on the role of Interim Conference Minister.

Finally, this report would be incomplete without recognition of the wonderful work of Barb Buxman, PNMC Administrative Assistant, and the local volunteer planning committee who organized all the logistics to make this Annual Meeting a success.

Nancy Kauffmann, Mennonite Church USA Denominational Minister, led this time of blessing. Nancy has already met with the Search Committee and the Board, and has helped us to think about particular aspects of the search process. Despite our current transition, I feel like PNMC is in a more stable place than during the Structure Vision time period. It feels like we are beginning our search process with more clarity for the Executive Conference Minister role than we had several years ago.

In addition to the ECM transition, delegates approved the ballot. See page 5 for a listing of these changes. The Board gives great thanks to persons who so freely share their time and talents. PNMC has been served by so many willing, dedicated and capable persons over the years and I am grateful that there continue to be persons who care about the health of our conference.

In all of this, I am reminded of Paul's writings that Jack referred to over the weekend. My hope is that we will be found "worthy of the gospel of Christ," and that we will stand "firm in one spirit, striving side by side with one mind for the faith of the gospel." (Philippians 1:27, NRSV)

At the 2011 Annual Meeting, David Stutzman was officially welcomed and blessed as PNMC's Interim Conference Minister. Dave actually began his quarter-time term on June 15, 2011, sharing the Conference Minister responsibilities with outgoing Executive Conference Minister, Iris de León-Hartshorn. Dave will serve quartertime until September 1st after which his commitment will increase to half-time.

PNMC is deeply grateful to Dave for his willingness to serve during this transitional time. Dave brings a wealth of experience and expertise to his role. He has served within PNMC organizations in numerous ways during the last forty-plus years. Specifically, he has served in ministerial roles for Portland Mennonite, Emmaus Fellowship, Western Mennonite, First Mennonite of Aberdeen and Albany Mennonite. The Potato Topping Decision (is what???)

A highlight of the Salem 2011 assembly for me was the "PNMC Potato Scenario" created and led by the Faith and Practice team. The exercise was designed to help delegates wrestle with the discussions taking place at the denominational level – and relevant to our regional conference – about how to make decisions as a church body.

In the exercise, table groups were given a scenario of a decision that needed to be made – the critical question of whether to serve butter and chives or meat gravy on potatoes – with half of the tables using a democratic (Robert's Rules of Order) decisionmaking process and the other half using a discernment model process. We observed, however, that the discernment model in this exercise was more similar to consensus-building than the Spirit-led, prayer-centered discernment process intended for a real issue.

Each person was given one of five roles to play, representing different perspectives on the question at hand. With a vegan, cattle rancher, dairy farmer, environmentalist and apple grower all at the table, coming to a group decision was going to require negotiation.

After the role-play, the group as a whole compared experiences and shared observations. More decisions were made by the Robert's Rules tables (with results ranging from one of the stated choices to "third way" alternatives like salsa), but some of those participants shared that they didn't feel very good about how the process went. In fact, both types of groups reported that emotions were high in the discussion.

It was fascinating to see how the exercise played out. Aside from the value of exploring the two decisionmaking models in this experiential way, I appreciated the exercise because I believe it's vital for church members to learn how to talk with each other about areas of disagreement - and an imaginary issue offers a non-threatening way to practice. We tend to perceive disagreement as a negative thing, but differing viewpoints are not inherently bad. We can learn to make decisions in ways that treat all people with respect and kindness. I welcome future opportunities to develop this skill among PNMC brothers and sisters.

Church Connections Mountain View (Montana)

How can I explain Mountain View Mennonite Church? Certainly several things should be said: We are hundreds of miles from any other MC USA congregation; we love to sing and to laugh; we are quite rural and our meetinghouse is ten miles east of Kalispell; it is difficult to imagine a church setting more beautiful than the backdrop of the Swan Mountain range. But those snapshots do not begin to capture the vitality that exists in the fellowship of our little church.

On a typical Sunday morning between 40 and 60 people meet for Sunday School and worship. By the coffee pot and always-present snacks, folks catch up with one another. We are from a variety of religious backgrounds: Roman Catholic, Southern Baptist, Mormon, Lutheran, nonchurched, non-denominational, Methodists, Church of Christ, and yes, some with Mennonite roots.

One hundred years ago, Mennonite farmers learned of the rich soil of the Creston area of the Flathead Valley and began moving here. They began meeting in homes for worship. In 1913, they built a small meetinghouse and formally organized as an Amish Mennonite congregation. With large families and rural

connectedness, a healthy congregation developed with a strong sense of Mennonite separation from the world.

In recent years the church has been going through rapid transition as the older generation -

born, raised and married in the church has been passing away. Simultaneously, a growing commitment to higher education sends youth off to college from which they seldom return. So our church family is now much smaller.

Today there continues to be a strong commitment to Anabaptism, but the energizing factor seems to be a common desire to care for one another while reaching beyond our church family. The worship team has been working to integrate our worship and sense of mission. In the Sunday bulletin, a page is dedicated to ways we are reaching out that week. The introduction reads: "At Mountain View Mennonite Church we strive to be a Spirit-filled community celebrating and listening to Christ as he develops us into relevant disciples serving God through others in the world."

Service is a church theme. Our most involved outreach is an after school childcare program which serves 25-30 children from two local elementary schools. Much effort also goes into our International Gift Festivals selling fair trade products and serving food in our

Village Café. Monthly we provide and serve a meal to the homeless in Feed the Flathead. Thursdays we sing with residents at the rehabilitation home, Heritage Place, and once a month lead Sunday worship there. For the past three years we have done a winter service project. This past year 8 persons went on a two-week MCC Work and Learn trip to Haiti.

Hundreds of prayer blankets and prayer shawls have been distributed. Mennonite Women is an active outreach. There is an annual Over 60s dinner for our community as well as Christmas caroling. We always seem to be collecting things: local Food Bank items, soup can labels for Children's Haven International, change jars for Hope Pregnancy Center and Smile Train, or Mennonite Central Committee relief items.

But the ministry theme is deeper than programs we do together. Each person is encouraged to find their own expression of personal ministry giftedness. The ministry gifts are endless.

If you would visit us on a Sunday morning, we would not seem that different from other congregations. You would find us visiting, studying, laughing, singing and praying together. And then as we combine our efforts we trust that the Spirit will grow our joy and our fellowship, enlarging our love and our witness.

Church Connections Eugene Mennonite (OR)

Eugene Mennonite Church began meeting together in 1964 and was officially organized in 1965. Two years later, they purchased their current property of 3.61 acres on 3590 W. 18th Avenue in Eugene, Oregon, while continuing to rent from the Four Oaks Grange Hall through 1976. The current building was dedicated in 1979, built with help from the Pacific Coast Conference Mission Board and volunteer labor from around the state.

Over the years, Eugene Mennonite has quietly been helping to birth another organization as well. In 1994, several women from the Eugene Friends Meeting approached the congregation about renting space for their dream of a private, alternative high school to meet the needs of students who did not fit well into the traditional academic climate. Thus, Wellsprings Friends School was founded.

It took great effort from the school and the church to make the arrangement work, particularly during the school's formative years. Now, 17 years later, the school is stable, thriving, has consistent and dedicated leadership and staff, and enrolls 60 high school students with more on a waiting list. Wellsprings is now the primary user group for our building and grounds.

Beginning in 2002, Wellsprings started contacting Eugene Mennonite about the possibility of purchasing the property in order to eventually build a



campus more suited to their educational goals. In 2009, a joint committee was formed to decide what the best possible scenario would be for both the church and the school. This committee met weekly for several months, looking into every possible option for the use of the grounds and ownership.

At the end of their time together, they concluded that the best course to pursue would be to reverse our current arrangement, selling the entire grounds to Wellsprings, with Eugene Mennonite being the renters. After discussion and prayer, negotiating a price and writing up an agreement, on Sunday, May 22, 2011, Eugene Mennonite Church voted unanimously to sell the property to Wellsprings, including a rental agreement along with the contract of sale.

Many, many people have come and gone through Eugene Mennonite Church over our years of existence. Likewise, many people have donated their time, talents and finances to help support us through the years, including the purchase of the property and the construction of our building. Your The space shared by Eugene Mennonite Church and Wellsprings Friends School



support has not only birthed Eugene Mennonite Church, but now has gone on to birth Wellsprings Friends School as well.

We want to honor all who had a part in our congregational journey over the years up until now. We offer our thanks to God for those who have helped us over the years and as we look forward to God's continued leading as we take this next step in our journey.
