Eastern Mennonite College



Bethany Chupp, a junior art and psychology major and resident of Canby, OR, was among over 200 students from <u>Eastern Mennonite University</u> who made the fall semester Dean's List. Chupp is a member of Zion Mennonite Church, Hubbard, OR. She is the daughter of Kevin and Cynthia Hockman-Chupp. (To qualify, a student must achieve a semester GPA of at least 3.750 or above and complete at least 12 semester hours of credit.) Eastern Mennonite University is a Christian liberal arts university of about 1,500 students, located in Virginia's scenic <u>Shenandoah Valley</u>. EMU is guided by the peace principles of <u>Mennonite Church USA</u>, educating students to serve and lead in a global context through cross-cultural study and an interdisciplinary curriculum. Established in 1917, the university

offers over 40 <u>undergraduate majors</u> and six <u>graduate programs</u> offering nine master's degrees. <u>Eastern Mennonite Seminary</u> is part of the university, as is the <u>Center for Justice and Peacebuilding</u>, which helped launch 2011 Nobel Peace Prize Laureate, <u>Leymah Ghowee</u>.

As cold temperatures and snow add another layer of deprivation to Syrians and Iraqis who have fled their homes because of violence, MCC is renewing its call for donations to address their needs. Many Iraqis who fled the Islamic State group are staying in the Kurdistan region of Iraq, one of the coldest areas of Iraq in the mountains near Turkey. "Some people are living in unfinished shell buildings with no insulation and sometimes with open door and window spaces," said Kaitlin Heatwole, MCC's program coordinator in Iraq. "They use tarps, floor rugs and blankets for insulation. Kerosene heaters are the primary source of heat." These conditions are repeated with different details in many locations throughout the Middle East, especially in Iraq, Lebanon, Jordan and Syria. The cold adds insult to injury, as if being forced from their homes by violence, losing family and friends, spending down all of their savings, and living in tents or empty buildings without a job aren't enough for displaced Iraqis and Syrians. From blankets to food vouchers, from relief kits to educational support, MCC works through churches and other community organizations to address basic needs of the most vulnerable families. "Although the needs feel overwhelming most days," said Naomi Enns, "our partners tell us repeatedly that receiving the blanket, the relief kit, or vouchers to pay rent or buy fuel is as much a message of hope as it is helpful in practical ways." <u>Luther Seminary</u> is pleased to announce that Rev. Iris de León-Hartshorn, director of transformative peacemaking for Mennonite Church USA, has been named the recipient of the seminary's "Race, Church and Change Award" for 2015. The award will be presented April 8 during services in the Chapel of the Cross at the seminary in St. Paul, MN. The Race, Church and Change award recognizes individuals who have significantly impacted society through ministries of racial justice and reconciliation. Luther Seminary presents this award on a regular basis to individuals who have heroically served in their community. De León-Hartshorn has worked within the Mennonite Church in various roles since 1996, serving as a leader in racial and gender justice in the church. She is currently director of transformative peacemaking in Portland, OR, for Mennonite Church USA. In this role, she coordinates initiatives and programs related to

the churchwide priority of "undoing racism and advancing intercultural transformation." De León-Hartshorn works within the denomination on core issues such as immigration, anti-racism efforts and intercultural competency to build bridges among cultures and move toward a transformed intercultural church. She is also involved in discussions the denomination is having on LGBT inclusion within the church. She is the co-author of Set Free: A Journey Toward Solidarity Against Racism (Herald Press, 2001). She is also a featured writer in the anthology Buffalo Shout, Salmon Cry-Conversations on Creation, Land Justice and Life Together, edited by Steve Heinrichs. She received her M.A. in Conflict Transformation and Peacebuilding from Eastern Mennonite University, Harrisonburg, VA, in 2005.
