



Mennonite Church USA

Are there people in your congregation or community who are new to the Christian faith or who want to grow in discipleship? <u>Begin Anew</u> is a 16-session series of studies to make disciples in small groups and congregations. Based on the idea that Christianity is a combination of believing, belonging, becoming, and behaving, the course is designed in a holistic way to bring about a clear faith in God as known in Jesus Christ; a solid sense of belonging in a family of loving people, and a disciplined lifestyle. This new lifestyle leads to becoming joyfully involved in ministries in the church and in God's mission in the world. This resource is for anyone interested in growing in Christian faith from an Anabaptist perspective, regardless of their background or previous church experience. *Begin Anew* is a joint project of Mennonite Church USA and Mennonite Church Canada. The sessions grew out of the congregational work and writing of the following individuals: Palmer Becker of Kitchener, Ont.; Howard Wagler of South Hutchinson, KS; and Marion Bontrager of Hesston, KS. The author discusses the interaction of these elements that have become familiar in current discussions about faith, church, and mission.

Mennonite Central Committee

Near the town of Minova in eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo, 276 families who were forced from their villages by armed groups are now growing their own gardens and working in a communal garden. These gardens, planted for the first time this year, provide **food and dignity** to people who can better support their families by working their own rented land instead of relying on inconsistent day labor in other people's fields. While the gardens were growing, families received distributions of corn, beans, oil and salt to help them through the transition from day labor to gardening.

This three-year project, funded by Mennonite Central Committee's (MCC) account at Canadian Foodgrains Bank and carried out by MCC's partner, Eglise du Christ au Congo, is accompanied by education for the families' children through MCC's Global Family education program. In Eastern Congo MCC also is supporting a repatriation project with Rwandan refugees and communal trauma healing workshops.
