

Speak out for peace! Students at Mennonite colleges recently participated in the **2016 C. Henry Smith Peace Oratorical Contest.** Each speaker applied the Christian peace position to a contemporary concern in 1,500 or less words. The contest, established in 1974 by the directors of the C. Henry Smith Trust, offers students an opportunity to discuss peacebuilding and social justice issues. The intercollegiate competition is administered by the Peace and Justice Ministries of MCC. Undergraduate students from every Mennonite and Brethren in Christ college in North America are eligible to participate. The **2016 winner at Eastern Mennonite University was Bethany Chupp**, a senior Psychology major from Canby, OR. Her speech, entitled Standing at the Door, is posted <u>here</u>. C. Henry Smith was an American Mennonite historian and professor at Mennonite colleges and the University of Chicago. He taught history for nearly 50 years at the collegiate level and is well-known for his numerous books on Mennonite history and his particular attention to the peace commitments of the Mennonite tradition.

Twenty of the papers presented at All You Need is Love: Honoring the Diversity of Women's Voices in Theology, the first Women Doing Theology Conference hosted by the Women in Leadership Project (WLP) of Mennonite Church USA, are featured in a book now <u>available online</u>. "I've spent a lot of time with these essays, and every time I came back to them I encountered something new — a new insight, a new idea, a new thought, a new challenge," says WLP Coordinator Jenny Castro, who edited the 216-page collection from the February 2014 conference, which was held in Leesburg, Virginia. "This collection offers people across Mennonite Church USA and the broader church fresh perspectives on self, God and our role in the world." Castro says the collection reflects diverse voices of women doing theology across the denomination addressing the question, "What does it mean to love in the midst of a world rife with struggle and oppression?" The authors of the papers in the collection share their biblical and theological reflections on expressions of Christian love through a variety of topics, including disability, technology, farming, yoga, business, sexual ethics, birth and infant loss. They explore Christian ecofeminism, feminist perspectives on the crucifixion, Christian and indigenous identities, and scriptural authority. They share personal stories of receiving insight, guidance and healing.
