Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary



In a time when many people are experiencing anxiety, trauma and upheaval, how can church leaders sustain Pastors & Leaders 2018 hope among the people they serve, even when they might struggle with fear, hopelessness and exhaustion themselves? Pastors and Leaders 2018 — an annual leadership conference formerly called Pastors Week — aims to help participants explore how "fear of the Lord" prepares them to live confidently and speak courageously at this moment in history, as well as to ground themselves in Christian practices that keep faith and hope alive. The event, on the theme "For Such a Time as This," will run from Feb. 26-March 1 on the AMBS campus in Elkhart, IN. The event will include worship, prayer, teaching sessions, workshops and large- and small-group conversations. Teachers and preachers from the seminary community will speak on the following topics:

- •Janna Hunter-Bowman, Ph.D., assistant professor of peace studies and Christian social ethics: "Going Big by Going Home: Local Responses to National Crisis" •Safwat Marzouk, Ph.D., associate professor of Old Testament: "Terror and Beauty in the House of the LORD"
- •Ben Ollenburger, Ph.D., professor of biblical theology: "Preachers Deaf and Blind, Servants of God the Creator"
- •Nancy Rodríguez-Lora, pastor, True Vine Tabernacle; clinical social worker; AMBS Master of Divinity student: "Boldness Before the Throne"
- •Allan Rudy-Froese, Ph.D., associate professor of Christian proclamation: sermon during Wednesday morning worship
- •Dan Schrock, D.Min., spiritual director & pastor; sessional instructor at AMBS: "Forgetting Ourselves in Prayer"
- •Rebecca Slough, Ph.D., academic dean and associate professor of worship and the arts: "Be Still Know I Am God"

In late 2017, eight small bags of medical supplies were packed and re-packed, crossed an ocean, passed through three countries and airport security checks before finally reaching their destination – a small medical clinic on a farm near Pyongyang. MCC colleagues, Chris Rice and Julie Bell, traveled to the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK), also known as North Korea, at a time when tensions between this country and other parts of the world have been running high. The team went to DPRK to visit some of the projects supported by MCC, including providing canned meat and soybean products to orphanages and schools and agricultural support on their farm. But the faces of the North Korean medical personnel lit up as they were told about a conversation during a previous visit to a

Pyongyang farm that prompted a collaboration of people around the world. During that visit, medical staff told MCC about accidents on the farm - everything from cuts and scrapes to sprains and broken bones. Word of the need for medical supplies traveled through MCC's regional office in South Korea and on to MCC offices in Canada and the United States. Thanks to the generosity of donors, supplies were purchased and delivered to the MCC material warehouse in Winnipeg, Manitoba, where Natalie Gulenchyn, a long-time volunteer, got involved. She cut the fabric and sewed the bags, complete with MCC's dove logo. Everything was packed into luggage for the long journey to DPRK. Upon arrival at the clinic, Bell watched with wonder as North Korean nurses and a doctor at the clinic thanked them for the supplies. She reflected, "I am so grateful for all the hands and hearts involved in bringing these simple gifts here. Donors, volunteers, MCC workers and their families – these people made it happen. On this day, the hostilities and harsh rhetoric of current times are irrelevant. I think about the many references in the Bible to 'do the work of God's hands.' The call to carry gifts of comfort and words of peace is the only truth that matters."
