Who Cares about Climate Change? *Pastoral responses to denial and despair* is a pastoral retreat hosted by PNMC, **September 9-11**, at Twin Rocks Friends Camp in Rockaway Beach, OR. The retreat is hosted by the Center for Sustainable Climate Solutions. Participants are invited to explore biblical, personal, scientific, and congregational aspects of climate change. Doug Kauffman, Director of Pastoral Ecology and pastor at Benton Mennonite Church, Goshen, IN, will lead along with Sarah Augustine, co-founder of the Dismantling the Doctrine of Discovery Coalition and executive director of the Dispute Resolution Center of Yakima and Kittitas Counties, Yakima, WA and a member of Seattle Mennonite Church, and Ken Pitts, a climate educator for Portland Metro and member of Portland Mennonite Church. There is no cost for pastors. Spouses are welcome to participate with a \$150 registration fee. If you are not a pastor or spouse and would like to attend, please contact Barb Buxman for details and availability. Register here. Not many church members really believe or practice this, of course, despite the fact that Jesus actually called the very first disciples to leave their fishing nets and follow him, so that he could send them out to "fish for people" (Matthew 4:19). This booklet raises important questions about the difference between being *disciples of Jesus* and being *Jesus' disciple makers*. Try out the questions on page 21 with your small group, Sunday school class, or ministry team. They are certain to generate a lively conversation and, potentially, a call to action! Thanks to the strong work of Brett Tieszen, Curt Weaver and Barb Buxman, the registration for the <u>2020 MCC Centennial Bike Ride</u>, <u>August 9-14, 2020</u> is live! They worked tirelessly on every detail and are amazing volunteers! The event will be based at the Aldersgate Retreat Center, outside of Salem, OR. It will include beautiful rides of varying lengths through the Willamette Valley to accommodate all bikers. The event is family friendly with multiple camping and lodging options. In years past participants paid a \$50 deposit and then the remainder closer to the event. Due to lodging commitments/contracts, we are now asking registrants to pay a minimum of 50% up front (with a credit card or check option). The committee recognizes that this might pose a burden but our hands are sort of tied with our current situation. Please feel free to contact the committee with questions or concerns regarding this.
You might notice that not much information is required at registration. At this point, planners are primarily seeking the number of expected participants, ages, lodging preferences and financial commitment. Additional information will be collected at a later date.
Tentative route links are posted. Routes are approximately 50-70 miles long, but a daily 20-30 mile option will likely be offered as well. Each ride offers a great snapshot of the beautiful Willamette Valley. Thanks to Don Yoder for getting these set up! Riders may want to take advantage of navigation apps for guidance. (Look for more details on the website as well as route updates in case of changes.)

Ride planners are eager to create an event that fits lots of abilities, ages, needs, etc. Feel free to come and ride as little or as much as you like! Aldersgate gives more opportunity for rest day activities if you want it, or for young kids to come along.
