Pastors and lay leaders from across PNMC gathered for the 2020 Conference Communications Council on Saturday, February 1 in Portland Mennonite's newly renovated basement. PNMC Moderator Jeryl Hollinger reflected: The gathering of about 50 conference representatives was a treat. I am thankful for this network of pastors and congregations that come together for support. I am thankful for our PNMC board and the gifted folks serving in this way. I am thankful for our conference staff who walk among the churches with a servant posture. I feel blessed to have these relationships and often wish more people from our congregations could participate. Katherine Pitts, our Executive Conference Minister was ill with the flu and unable to attend. We missed her presence.

Two resource women from MCC Central States led our thinking and conducted activities around the theme of racism. In our conference, many of our churches consist of persons with white European background. But we also have Hispanic congregations and one African Congolese church. These groups were all represented. Discussion of racism includes the uncomfortable subject of power, white privilege, values and value formation. While we know racism is an issue and needs our attention and work, as a white person, it can be easy to ignore these hard issues and pretend that all is well. But it is important that we evaluate our own perspectives in order to achieve a deeper understanding of the experiences of our brothers and sisters. The afternoon concluded with prayer and worship graciously led Angel and Luz Campoz.

The program, entitled "The Lady Is Our Shepherd", featured the story of Mennonite women pastors in the Northwest. The program featured Marlene Kropf who is now retired from MC USA where she served as Minister of Spirituality and Worship and also as a professor at AMBS. Marlene, an Oregon-native who grew up at Sheridan Mennonite Church, moderated the event's intergenerational guest panel which included three PNMC female pastors, representing the PNMC/PCC timeline since the ordination of the first female pastor in the conference. The panel included Jeanie Hershey, now retired from serving as an active pastor; Kathy Bilderback from Evergreen Heights Mennonite Church in Caldwell, ID; and Megan Ramer, lead pastor from Seattle Mennonite Church. Each speaker was invited to share her sense of calling, as well



as the satisfactions and challenges of serving as a woman in pastoral leadership. Collectively, the pastors represented congregations which varied from rural to inner-city. Mennonite Women

Carolyn Heggen and Rhoda Keener shared the Sister Care seminar January 20-22 near Chiang Mai for 55 enthusiastic Hmong women from Thailand and Laos. Memee Yang, (pictured center), Minneapolis, provided interpretation for the seminar. When asked about challenges or problems of Hmong women in their churches and communities, the responses of women leaders from 17 churches included, "Hmong women are very low in our culture and we have no voice." "Hmong women are not given permission to share problems with other women or teach." It was significant for the attendees that the seminar was for women only. One woman said, "I want you to know this is the first time for our Hmong women that we have had a teaching just for women." Another in her closing devotional said the experience had shown that "When women come together and talk to each other, it is like sweet candy in our mouths." Many dressed in traditional



hand-embroidered clothing and shared these beautiful clothes with Carolyn, Memee, and Rhoda for a day. The seminar was funded by United Service Foundation, MCC, individuals, Emmanuel Mennonite Church, and Central Plains Mennonite Conference.
