CMFers, Ed and Gwen Peachey served in Bangladesh with MCC in the late 1980s. In response to MCC's recent #donutsformcc social media campaign, Ed decided to participate in the effort! He crafted 251 handmade donuts on Saturday, June 6 to raise funds to help address the cancellation of numerous relief sales due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Ed set up donut operation in his car port and got to work with help from Joe and Lisa Ebersole. The crew took pre-orders from Corvallis Mennonite folks and got to work. Ed started the operation at 3:30 am on Saturday. Customers came to Ed's drive way to pick up the donuts between 7 and 10 am. Ed has always wanted to have his own donut shop so the project was a bit of a dream come true! The recipe used was from Edna Ruth Byler (page 65) in the *More With Less* cookbook. Toppings included: peanut butter, maple flavor, classic glaze, and powdered sugar. Each donut averaged \$27.88 for MCC!

If you are ready to address the question, "Has the church been complicit in a racist society?" then consider this book from Herald Press. The high-profile killings of young black men and women by white police officers, and the protests and violence that ensued, have convinced many white Christians to reexamine their intuitions when it comes to race and justice.

In this provocative book, theologian and blogger Drew G. I. Hart places police brutality, mass incarceration, anti-Black stereotypes, poverty, and everyday acts of racism within the larger framework of white supremacy. Leading readers toward Jesus, Hart offers concrete practices for churches that seek solidarity with the oppressed and are committed to racial justice.

Hart shares, "I wrote #TroubleI'veSeen to and for the church. So that local churches can rediscover the radical way of Jesus in a world still captive to white supremacy. We must identify the ways the church has been complicit in our racist society, and the ways we can reject hierarchy and domination and pursue solidarity with the oppressed, through Jesus-shaped justice and service."

From Iris de León-Hartshorn is associate executive director for Operations for Mennonite Church USA: This last week has been a very dark time for our country. Deaths are still rising due to COVID-19, deaths continue to increase of black men killed by those who are supposed to protect them. In Glen Guyton's monthly chat on Facebook last week, he called for a Justice Fund to be created. The distribution of funds will go to congregations that are doing work to dismantling racism in their community. The work could include engaging with issues related to combating police violence and addressing poverty. Racism is embedded in the majority of our institutional structures; therefore, there is much work to be done. You might ask why set up a justice fund. There are several reasons:

- If the church is serious about working at dismantling racism, it must be intentional. Resources are needed to do the work.
- This fund is a way to practice mutual aid. Some congregations working on issues connected to dismantling racism are small and may not have the resources they need to be more effective. This fund is a way to encourage and show support for the work throughout the church by our congregations.
- This fund can provide seed money for congregations starting to engage in this work within their community. Read more here.

MMN is committed to training church leaders to develop a culture of discipleship. Effective disciple-making takes place through close relationships. The Missional Discipleship Initiative (MDI) strengthens congregations and their ministries through intentional, authentic, and relational disciple-making.
