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Welcome to the 2020 PNMC Virtual Gathering

April 2020

To congregations and delegates of Pacific Northwest Mennonite Conference,

I'm writing to announce that we will have a 2 hour ZOOM PNMC delegate meeting at 9:00 am Pacific Time (8:00 am Alaska Time; 10:00 am Mountain Time) on **Saturday, June 27, 2020**.

As you are aware, we have cancelled our highly anticipated PNMC annual assembly previously scheduled to take place in Seattle this year. We are not certain what the guidelines will be by that time to keep the COVID-19 virus at bay, but the board has decided, along with the folks in Seattle, that it is wisest to refrain from planning a large gathering at this time.

And yet the board still desires the efforts of PNMC delegates to give ear and voice to several areas of business. We want to hear each other as congregations respond to a roll call. We want to report on the ministry and finances of PNMC over the past year. We need to have delegate approval of the nominee slate prepared by the Gift Discernment Team. We want to give opportunity for questions and views that will strengthen the ministry of PNMC. For these reasons we are scheduling this online delegate meeting. We think we can do it in 2 hours.

More information, reports and expectations will be sent in the next month concerning this ZOOM gathering. But at this point, we are asking two things:

- 1. Let us know who will be attending and who the delegates are from your congregation by registering online at https://pnmc.org/delegate-meeting-2020/. We need their email addresses. This will allow us to send meeting guidance and information directly to those who need it.
- 2. We'd like a written paragraph and a photo of some aspect of your congregational life. We have been considering such reporting from congregations for our annual report booklet, and we think this year would be a good year to try it. This year's annual booklet will be a reduced version from years past, but we will grow this new section on congregational life. We'd like these reports by May 8.

Our life together will take an unusual format this year as we gather on June 27. But it remains an important part of who we are and how we want to be in relationship with one another. Christ is at work among us in varied and interesting ways. The ministry of PNMC continues to be to strengthen that witness and come together to celebrate our shared faith.

Report from Executive Conference Minister

The theme for the PNMC Annual Gathering 2020 was to be "Being Church 2020". We hoped that as we gathered in Seattle we would share how we are being church in 2020 and sharpen our vision of church in the future. However, if I were to propose a theme today, it would be "Thanks be to God."

It is amazing how quickly things can change! So much is different now. Last fall and winter were among my busiest. I worshipped with 14 congregations and visited 8 states and a Canadian province. What a difference a tiny virus can make! Now, it is as if someone took an eraser to my travel plans and wiped out the coming months!

And yet, reflecting on the past several months, constrained as they have been by "stay at home" orders, I can see clearly what being church 2020 is for the congregations of PNMC. It's the words at the top of this page – flexible, resourceful, patient, resilient, agile, active, compassionate. Your ability to respond and adapt to new ways of being and to new needs in your communities has amazed me. And you continue to ground it all in your faith in Christ and love for God. Thanks be to God!

One of the joys of the past year has been the Healthy Congregation Grant program -- both making new awards and seeing how the grants have been used. Seventy-five youth participated in a weekend retreat. Worshippers heard the service in their own languages. Leaders grew in biblical knowledge and leadership skills. Congregations envisioned their future. Immigration legal expenses were covered. A pastor will gain new skills in interim ministry. Thanks be to God!

This year we were challenged to think deeply about concerns that may require us to change. Pastors and leaders learned about climate change and how congregations could respond. At our Conference Communications Council, we worked at developing intercultural competency. Congregations explored how the doctrine of discovery misshaped our understanding of Native American peoples through drama and education. Thanks be to God!

In congregations large and small, rural and urban, old and new, we prayed and sang, we studied the scriptures, and the gospel was preached. New people joined us, children grew, the regulars showed up, and everyone was invited to a deeper faith in the God who holds us even in times of tremendous change. And then, when we needed to, you quickly learned how to use Zoom, or Facebook live, or YouTube. Thanks be to God!

This year there were only a few changes in leadership. As we announced last year Bryce Miller began as pastor at Menno last August. Ron Hershey will begin "officially" as pastor at Filer on June 1st. We welcome interim pastors Terry Rediger at Western and Bill Blank at Zion. In addition, Sylvia Shirk, Terry Rediger, and Merritt Welty have joined our District Pastor team. Thanks be to God!

The coming year is likely to be as disruptive as the past one. We know that we cannot control the future, but we know the One who does. May the congregations of PNMC continue to be flexible, resourceful, patient, resilient, agile, active, and compassionate. Thanks be to God!

Board of Directors Report

Since the 2019 annual PNMC assembly the board met 3 times with another meeting scheduled for May 2020. Our September meeting was a two-day event in Portland and the first meeting of this new board. The next meeting was a conference call in December. In February the board met in conjunction with the Conference Communication Council (CCC) meeting at Portland Mennonite Church. The May meeting will be held via ZOOM. The minutes of our meetings are made public via the pnmc.org web page.

An overarching theme of the board this year was policy review. PNMC has a set of policies many-of-which haven't been reviewed for a length of time. Some of them we deemed unnecessary and retired them. Others were updated and approved. And still others were newly created. We reorganized the layout of the policy booklet and set a procedure for regularly reviewing policies in the future.

In the previous year the board had decided that we should have an active finance committee. PNMC currently has significant financial investments and few of us on the board have expertise in financial management. We approved a policy document and job description for developing a finance committee. The Gift Discernment Team recommended a list of potential team members which the board approved. We are thankful for Jack Swaim, Brett Tieszen, and PNMC treasurer David Hockman-Wert who are now serving on this team led by PNMC board member Janet Szabo. They will add much depth to our financial decision-making and the May board meeting will include the first report from the finance team which began meeting this spring.

ECM Katherine Jameson Pitts, Moderator-elect Dianna Eshleman and I represented PNMC at the MC USA Constituency Leaders Council (CLC) this year which usually meets twice each year. Our PNMC board tries to engage the matters dealt with at CLC as they pertain to our conference. A primary issue for CLC this year has been the MC USA membership guidelines and much CLC energy was put into that discussion. But the spring CLC meeting was cancelled due to the COVID-19 social distancing practices and it seems as though the membership guideline discussion has now been put on hold.

I'm thankful for our board members who have engaged in the conversations and work involved in guiding the conference. Jenna Schlegel Preheim resigned from her term on the board and the board has welcomed Deren Kellogg from Seattle Mennonite Church to complete her term. I'm grateful for the work of our Gift Discernment Team in guiding us to good people to serve in a variety of conference ministries.

The coronavirus threat experienced by the world this year has had an effect on the work of our conference congregations, teams and staff. So much of our conference life and ministry involves getting together. As moderator this has meant keeping in touch with our ECM as her life and work was altered. As a board it has meant that our May meeting to be held in Kalispell is being reduced to several ZOOM gatherings. As a conference it has meant that our annual meeting planned to be held in Seattle has been cancelled. We are now in the process of deciding how our PNMC delegate business can be conducted in a manner conducive to ZOOM.

As I conclude my time as PNMC moderator I am thankful for the privilege to serve in this way. I value each relationship as well as the opportunity to engage in the life of the wider church. I encourage others to take the opportunity to serve the wider church, if possible. It is a gift to be enjoyed.

Pacific Northwest Mennonite Conference DELEGATES: WHO THEY ARE AND WHAT THEY DO

(March 2013)

WHO IS THE PNMC DELEGATE BODY?

- 1. Each PNMC member congregation is entitled to one delegate for each twenty-five of its members, or fraction thereof. (PNMC bylaws, Article III, 3, g)
- 2. All ordained or licensed ministers, whose ministerial credentials have been recognized by PNMC and who are considered active, with charge are entitled to be delegates. (PNMC Bylaws, Article III, 3, g)

WHO SHOULD CONGREGATIONS CHOOSE TO BE THEIR DELEGATES?

- 1. Congregations have the freedom to choose who will best represent their congregation in the PNMC delegate body.
- 2. Delegates should be members of the congregation they represent. Preferably, some of a congregation's delegates will bring a congregational leadership perspective having continuity with the congregation, understanding the range of views in the congregation and their own views respected within their congregation.
- 3. Delegates should hold to the vision and commitments of PNMC (Bylaws Article III, 2):
 - a. The vision and mission statements of Mennonite Church USA and PNMC
 - b. Common Confession of Faith in a Mennonite Perspective, as updated from time to time, as their "statement of faith for teaching and nurture in the life of the Church"
 - c. Commitment "to seek to understand and interpret Scripture in harmony with Jesus Christ as we are led by the Holy Spirit in the Church"
 - d. Commitment to participate in discerning and living out statements of Christian faith and life made by Mennonite Church USA and PNMC
 - e. Commitment to participate in the life and mission of PNMC and Mennonite Church USA through delegate representation and financial support.

WHAT DO DELEGATES DO?

1. Fulfill the role as defined in the PNMC bylaws: (Article IV, 2):

<u>Purpose:</u> Delegates appointed by the Member Congregations have the authority to transact the business of PNMC, including but not limited to the following actions:

- a. Discuss and decide major issues of policy for PNMC, and discern the voice of the Spirit in the midst of the Member Meeting.
- b. Provide opportunity to speak to the establishment of general policies and the development of programs to carry out those policies.
- c. Receive reports from the Board, PNMC staff, teams and other conference activities. Reports shall be presented in writing and shall include financial accounting.

WHAT DO DELEGATES DO?, CONTINUED

- d. Elect the following as needed:
- (1) Moderator Elect.
- (2) Board members to fill new terms and vacancies.
- (3) Secretary and Treasurer.
- (4) Gift Discernment Team members. This team identifies and recommends persons to the Board to fill elected positions which need to be affirmed by the delegates at the annual Member Meeting.
- (There may also be other elections as deemed necessary by the Board of Directors.)

2. Gathered Discernment:

PNMC is comprised solely of Mennonite congregations in the Pacific Northwest. These congregations meet in annual assembly the fourth weekend of June. The delegate body assembly is a forum for these congregations to talk together and to discern together the voice of the Holy Spirit. This forum helps the church move beyond its usual congregational ways of thinking and acting. Discernment happens as delegates together Dwell in the Word, meditate, pray, share, discuss and listen to one another. The value of this discernment is not realized primarily in formal actions. It is realized in the worship and dialogue itself as it informs, inspires and builds up our conference, denominational and congregational life.

3. Communication channel:

It is our intent that delegates help the conference stay focused on the value of PNMC to congregational life: 1. guiding through pastoral transitions; 2. helping plan for the future; 3. resourcing lay leaders; and 4. strengthening the ministry of pastors. This is accomplished by:

- a. Delegates represent their congregation's voice into the PNMC body. They receive PNMC staff and board reports and interact with the board and staff to provide counsel and direction.
- b. Delegates represent the PNMC body to their home congregations by relaying annual delegate session discussions.
- c. Throughout their term as delegate each provides a primary interaction service between PNMC staff and board and their home congregation. They may be sought for counsel or communication between the annual delegate sessions via email or snail mail.
- d. One congregational delegate shall serve on the Conference Communications Council.

THE DELEGATES' TERM OF SERVICE

In the fall of each year, the PNMC office will request a list of its delegates from each congregation. One of the delegates should represent the congregation, along with a pastor, at the winter Communications Council meeting. We hope that all the delegates shall represent the congregation at the summer annual assembly. Delegates shall serve in that role until a different list of delegates is requested the following fall.

Congregational Transitions

Spring Valley concluded the process of closing and selling their building to another Anabaptist congregation. In January, Anawim Christian Community officially closed as a congregation and ministry, although some of their work continues through the Village of Hope organization. Warden Mennonite Church decided to move forward to cease having regular worship services and to sell their building.

PNMC Healthy Congregation Grants

The Healthy Congregation Grant Program seeks to promote projects that help your congregation strengthen its mission, witness, outreach to your community and/or life together as the body of Christ.

We have awarded 6 grants to date. We have assisted in the following:

<u>Treasurer's Report – Dave Hockman-Wert</u>

Dave went over the income and expenses in relation to the 2019 Budget and presented the 2020 Budget (summary) with visuals. Overall, our actual operating income in 2018-19 exceeded our budgeted income by about \$32,000, thanks largely to a generous estate gift. Expenses were about \$4,200 less than budgeted, leading to a net operating income of about \$27,000. PNMC's budgeted bottom line of a small operating loss has turned into an actual small gain!

PNMC Board opened an investment management account totaling \$950,000 with Everence Trust Company in June 2018. The new account is referred to as "Endowment Funds" on the balance sheet. This past year, the Board has been developing policies to guide the management and disbursement of these funds. "Healthy Congregation" grants were created and a "Sustainability Fund" to allow 4% interest to be withdrawn annually, both to have more "liquid" funds available for ongoing PNMC operations as well as to maintain the principal. As of April 23, 2019, the investment account totaled \$986,072, after a big dip in December and a big rise in the first part of 2019.

He also presented a graph showing income and expense history and balance sheet history since 2000.

Overall, we are in good financial shape as a conference. Now the challenge is how to be faithful stewards of our financial resources. Questions from delegates included asking about the vision for PNMC. This is something the Board will continue to wrestle with asking for input from congregations.

PNMC Ballot

Ballots were distributed to delegates to mark for affirmation; then ballots were collected.

2nd Delegate Session - 3:30-4:30 p.m.

The afternoon session began with pastor Kevin Chupp of Aberdeen making a presentation to Iris de León Hartshorn on behalf of Cecil Miller who was not present to do it himself. It was a plaque concluding the "Potato War" between Washington and Idaho, noting Carl Hege's death this spring.

Moderator's Report

Jeryl made note of his moderator report (pages 5 & 6) of the Handbook and added comments on several other items: He handed out a copy of policy change of policy 99-3 5 **Membership of Member Churches** with the delegate body. Take this back to your local congregations. Added a Child-safety policy as a requirement of member churches.

On Conference Historian, the Board decided to discontinue this position. History records will be kept with the Mennonite Historical Society.

Asked how can we expand the Anabaptist vision and network in the Pacific Northwest? If you would like be included in brainstorming about this, please talk to Jeryl.

Recognition of Members going off the Board: Kathleen Aeschliman, Jack Swaim, Jenna Schlegel-Preheim **Questions posed for moderator and board:** What is our vision? Our conference needs to make a statement to our hurting communities.

- Anabaptist witness in our communities.
- Peace witness
- Passion-based ministries

Commitment questions for table groups. Table discussion groups addressed the questions listed below. It was also suggested that we post these questions for people to take back to their congregations.

Within PNMC, what is our commitment to one another?

- Some of our commitment to one another is expressed through participation in conference programs and events. Some is expressed through informal relationships and other ways in which we cooperate for worship or service. What are the ways your congregation expresses its commitment to our life together within PNMC?
- PNMC offers several avenues for congregations to express commitment to our life together. We wonder how committed congregations are to these things? In board meetings several questions surrounding the subject of commitment have arisen:
 - Meetings: We presently have two delegate gatherings a year: CCC in January or February, and the annual meeting. At times we have planned a pastor and spouse retreat. Some have suggested we need gatherings for youth. Are congregations committed to these supporting pastors and delegates and youth to attend?
 - Finances: The board has tried to live financially within the giving amount coming from congregations. But recently we have needed to rely on investment funds to balance the budget funds we would like to use for more visionary work. Some congregations have asked what dollar amount we expect from them but the board has been reluctant to set standards that some others will have difficulty meeting. What kind of financial commitment to PNMC is your congregation comfortable with?
 - Disagreements: When divisive issues touch our conference life, how committed is your congregation to remaining in fellowship and discussion with other congregations in PNMC? How is such a commitment expressed in your congregation? Should the board be giving guidance and help in this area?

Treasurer's Report / Financial Reports

PNMC Treasurer's Report – Fiscal Year Ending 2020

As I write this, the Covid-19 emergency is in full swing, causing financial distress in many parts of the economy. Churches are no exception. In the first two weeks that it was open, the COVID-19 Congregational Relief Fund, created by Mennonite Disaster Service, Everence, and Mennonite Central Committee U.S., had received 200 applications from Anabaptist congregations requesting assistance. Clearly, some are hurting.

We know that some of our PNMC congregations may be struggling as well. While the conference finances are in a very good place at the moment, thanks to the investment account we have with Everence, the board has neither received requests for, nor discussed any plans to provide, direct, need-based assistance as of now. This may change as the Covid-19 emergency plays out over the coming months. Certainly the "conference" only exists as the "web" that connects individual congregations, so the health of the parts affects the health of the whole. In other words, we want you all to be healthy – spiritually, socially, and financially!

To that end, the Healthy Congregations Grant Fund is available and well-funded, so if your congregation has ideas that might fit with this program, be sure to check out the guidelines on our website (https://pnmc.org/resources/documents/) and apply.

We realize the present emergency might affect congregational giving, so we are glad to have the cushion that we do have. Until things get back to "normal," whatever that may look like, PNMC will be okay, financially. Given the growth in the markets this past year (prior to the disruption in March, of course), and the sufficiency of our bank balances, we chose not to withdraw anything from the investment fund account. After surpassing \$1 million in November 2019, the fund balance dropped as the stock market dropped, resulting in a return to a level similar to when it began, \$956,000, as of May 2020.

Overall, our actual operating income in 2019-20 exceeded our budgeted income by about \$11,000, thanks largely to accrued investment income. Expenses were about \$7500 less than budgeted, thanks to lower travel, meeting, and staffing costs. This led to a net operating income of about \$8,400 (compared to a budgeted loss of \$10,500). So as I wrote last year, for yet another year, PNMC's budgeted bottom line of a small operating loss has been turned into an actual small gain! Overall, we are in good financial shape as a conference.

Last year they took the first step by agreeing that the two congregations will have services together on Sundays. With this step, Roca De Salvación will not have services or Sunday school on Sundays, with the exception of Fridays that will continue to celebrate their worship in Spanish.

<u>COMUNIDAD CRISTIANA VIDA NUEVA</u>: Is discerning about the process that leads them to search for a new pastor.

Mission: "We seek to collect and preserve historical materials and to celebrate the heritage of Mennonites in the Pacific Northwest in order to educate, inspire, and witness to the church and broader community."

There is nothing new under the sun" so said the wisest man, Solomon. Or you've heard "what goes around comes around," plus this one I like so much, "Those who don't know history are doomed to repeat it." I think I've often used all of these quotes more than one time!

So in this way I trekked over to the Ivan and Pearl Kropf Heritage Center to check out what was going on in the Mennonite congregations and conferences of the northwest during the time of the so-called "Spanish Flu," 1918-1919. I thought I should find some reference but only this handwritten line "Rescheduled for conference 1919." This was on the printed conference program prepared for 1918 and held in Creston, Montana 1919. I was happy to find that. But I thought surely there must be some note in a ministers' meeting or a minister's file somewhere, I did not find anything in my review and there are very few personal collections from that time.

My mother was one who had suffered this flu and was not expected to survive. She told us her story more than once and I was aware of the awful frightening time. I discovered others had not learned this piece of history. One other Mennonite history note is the Mennonite Church General Conference (not GC MC) canceled its large meeting in Virginia and postponed one year because of this illness. So again, there is nothing new under the sun.

As PNMHS is the keeper of northwest Mennonite history we are interested in all the aspects of Mennonite life, church, families and individuals. The context and times we live in shape our lives and our faith. You might keep this in mind as you sort through your own papers and treasures. PNMHS offers its wonderful archival space to preserve and protect these. <u>AND</u>, we encourage, and can advise congregations on how to keep your records safe and protected and how / when to transfer to PNMHS Heritage Center. Several congregations have this process ongoing with PNMHS.

We remind you again of the large library of books regarding Mennonite life, doctrine, history, genealogy, family stories and Mennonite fiction. PNMC AREA ORGANIZATION REPORTS

CAMP PALISADES

Our theme for last summer came from 1 Corinthians 13:13— "And now these three remain: faith, hope, and love, but the greatest of these is love." Each day was centered on the individual concepts of faith, hope, or love. We began each day in the Psalms before breakfast, and throughout the day we make time for reflection individually, together at the campfire, and in dorms before bed. Overall, we try to focus on creating space for spiritual formation and inspiring curiosity about a loving creator. I have gradually learned over the last few years that former directors and speakers at our camp portrayed God as an angry God, and they were focused on manipulating emotions in order to create conversion experiences. We are always making conscious efforts to leave that way behind.

Both camps went relatively according to plan with some minor interruptions. I shared an account of one particularly eventful day in the PNMC e-Bulletin in December, and will share a brief glimpse into other eventful days here. One day when it was supposed to rain all day, the rain stopped completely during the time that we were hiking and swimming. Later on in the week, on the way to a raft trip, the bus blew a tire and it was fixed before the campers climbed back on the bus after rafting. We also encountered road construction and traffic from a flaming tree that had fallen across the highway after being struck by lightning. We were never bored!

We had nine senior campers and eleven junior campers. As usual, it was a challenge to find volunteers to serve as counselors. We found a solution to that problem by having mature male senior campers "lead" their cabin for senior camp and stay to serve as counselors for junior camp. Many of our campers are regular attenders from our wider Southeast Idaho community. We were also pleased this year to have kids from First Mennonite Church, Filer Mennonite Church, Evergreen Heights Mennonite Church, and Hyde Park Mennonite Fellowship—which was more Mennonite representation than we have had since I started.

We have enjoyed being able to be involved with Grand Teton National Park, and they have been generous in allowing us free or reduced admission on multiple occasions. However, we are committed to making new experiences for campers and we will likely not spend time in the park this year. And speaking of this summer, there is a lot of uncertainty surrounding what we might be able to do in 2020. We are fortunate to have a good core group of people ready to help us if we are able to have camp. However, we anticipate the possibility that we may need to cancel.

Mennonite Village continues to play a significant role in the Albany Community. Currently close to 700 residents are served in all of the collective levels of care and over 400 employees are employed by this organization. Several employees have served Mennonite Village for well over 20 years.

Some key highlights over the last year:

- 1. Nursing Home remodel: The new construction and remodel of the Nursing Home is now complete. The end results are wonderful rooms with bathrooms and showers. The majority of the rooms will be private allowing those receiving short stay rehab or calling the campus home to have their own private space. This has been a dream that has been a long time in the making. As staff we are so grateful for all of the support that has been given to make this dream a reality.
- 2. Expansion of the focus on Wellness: Wellness is more than the absence of an illness. Spiritual, Physical, Emotional, Intellectual, Environmental, Social and Mental Wellness all have a role in defining well-being. Our Wellness Team along with the Chaplains are doing a fabulous job in providing a variety of program options in which residents can choose to participate.
- 3. Surviving COVID-19: In some ways it is hard to remember operations before COVID. As I type this report, the staff continues to rise up and figure out new ways to serve the residents. Technology has allowed things like Bible studies, exercise classes and connections with families to remain strong. So many extraordinary acts of kindness from the community have surfaced during this time!

A heartfelt thank you to the Pacific Northwest Conference and local congregations as this organization continues to be enhanced by your volunteerism, thoughtful prayers and other ways that you share your time and talents with us. All of the support helps, as we strive to live out our mission "To be a Christ-centered community providing life-enriching services."

PNMC CONGREGATIONAL UPDATES:

ALBANY MENNONITE:

Our bulletin covers for 2019-2020 have declared this to be our year of "Living as God's People." In particular, we designed the year so that we would strengthen our identity through a congregation-wide renewal process that would be led by Betty Pries of Credence & Co. Then in January, just as we were all gearing up for Betty's arrival from Canada, her visa was unexpectedly denied by U.S. Customs and Border Protection. So we postponed for March 13th, and we *waited* as God's people. At 3:00 a.m. on March 12th, however, I called Betty—now with her visa in hand and about to leave for the airport—to let her know that Oregon no longer looked like a safe place to visit. It was the moment that we as a congregation—although

we didn't know it yet—went from just waiting as God's people to *physical-distancing* as God's people. And yet, as we've practiced physical distancing, we've discovered ourselves to be living as God's people nonetheless. It's evident as we faithfully greet and tease each other in our pre-service Zoom ecoffee times. It's evident as we take and share pictures of despair and hope from our homes and walks each week. And it's evident as we collectively beef up our sharing fund and make new donations to the Farmworker Emergency Fund and Mid-Valley Gleaners. Though our ushers may not be handing out those bulletins that say it anymore, it's happening: through disruptions and even some despair, *we're living as God's people*.

Despite the fact that no one was going to be there to see it in person, Judy and Mark Nord still decorated the AMC sanctuary as planned for Easter, decking it out with paper cranes, candles, and greenery. Their pictures of it have become a symbol of hope that we've used at the beginning of each online service ever since.

BEND MENNONITE:

Even in the midst of this pandemic, Bend Mennonite is, by the grace of God, doing well. Our little church has been meeting—as many others have—on Zoom. We gather, share our lives, read scripture, pray, and participate in a sermon. We even added a new family to our church during this time—and a newborn to one of our families. And, our members have suffered incredible loss as well. Central to our concern as a church is how we can be faithful to Jesus, for the sake of our neighbors, during a time when meeting people in person is, for many, too dangerous.

COMUNIDAD CRISTIANA VIDA NUEVA, SALEM, OR:





We have continued on the trajectory begun nearly two years ago to replant our congregation. At that time, we chose not to change the name, yet that might as we continue through the replanting process. We enjoy being outside, especially when we worship in the park with the other Treasure Valley Mennonites. Three things that that we have been doing in the replanting process involve resourcing ourselves; building up

our ability to articulate faith; and supporting our local schools. To resource our replanting efforts, Salina Jordan and Craig Morton participated in the Mennonite Mission Network's SENT Cohort for peace church planting training. To build up our ability to speak about faith in our context we've read and spoken with theologians, activists, and writers: Thomas Jay Oord (in our backyard), Richard Beck (Zoom), Doug Pagitt (Zoom), and Mark Karris (Zoom). The elders responded with gratitude that we reached out, and informed us that our location was not associated with a village, seasonal camp, or resource gathering site, and blessed us to move forward with our development discernment. There is much work ahead, but we desire that our property be a blessing in our neighborhood, and we are excited for what's to come.

2020 Annual Report to Area Conferences

Mennonite Men is the men's organization of Mennonite Church USA and Mennonite Church Canada. Our mission: Engaging men to grow, give and serve as followers of Jesus. Our two programs, JoinHands and JoinMen, served this mission in several ways in the last year.

JoinHands: Grants for New Churches

Thanks to generous contributions from individuals and congregations, Mennonite Men has granted over 2 million dollars through its JoinHands program to assist new congregations in acquiring their first church building.

In 2019 we extended grants to three Mennonite churches.

\$30,000 to Eden Life International Church in Kansas City, Missouri. This congregation in South Central Mennonite Conference serves four language communities: Amharic (Ethiopia), Anouk (Sudan, Ethiopia), English (second generation immigrants), and Swahili/French (Congo).



\$40,000 to Unity Church of God in Homestead, Florida (pictured to the left). This Haitian Mennonite congregation in Southeast

Conference is active serving their community.


\$40,000 to Centro de Alabanza in Philadelphia, PA (below). This Mennonite congregation in Franconia Conference has a rich diversity of members from Ecuador, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico, Panama, Puerto Rico, the United States and Venezuela. The church is active with Instituto Bíblico Anabautista (Anabaptist Biblical Institute) and engaged in several ministries in their neighborhood.



These racial-ethnic congregations represent a significant growth edge in our Mennonite church. We are grateful to share our resources with these churches and receive their witness of dynamic engagement in mission.

JoinMen: Resources and Retreats for Men

What does Anabaptism have to teach us about healthy masculinity? Our new book, Peaceful at Heart: Anabaptist Reflections on Healthy Masculinity, seeks to answer this question. Working with the Institute of Mennonite Studies, this project of Mennonite Men is by and for men, promoting an Anabaptist Christian perspective on masculinity.

2019 Mennonite Women USA Report

OUR MISSION: Mennonite Women USA is a sisterhood of Anabaptist women following Jesus.

OUR VISION: Engaging the prophetic voices of all women as we honor our stories, share grace, practice justice and embrace healing.

Executive Summary

Mennonite Women USA (MW USA) is amidst transformation. We are living into our new vision at a time in church history where the denomination is experience major changes. MW USA is prime to lead and empower women throughout the church to assist the broader church in carving a new path.

I. Cooperation with Churches and Agencies

- 1. MW USA has visited 20 Mennonite churches as a guest and speaker.
- 2. MW USA met with female church leaders across the United States and internationally to discuss our work.
- MW USA sponsored several gatherings encouraging women in the church to connect across traditional
 divides through our Choosing Sisterhood initiative. Women in Conversation has provided a platform for
 women to address issues facing our families and communities. These gatherings have been well attended.
- MW USA has prioritized listening to young women in the church. We have visited three Mennonite Colleges with the sole purpose of listening to the needs of our younger sisters.
- MW USA also met with international students at Hesston College, listening to the needs of women of color on campus. Together we brainstormed ways in which women throughout MW USA might be of service.
- MW USA continues to provide over 20 scholarships annually to international students through our International Women's Fund. These scholarships assist women studying in the field of theology, Anabaptist and church history, ministry and pastoral care and counseling.
- 7. MW USA attended the Everence Development Conference obtaining useful material to support our work.
- 8. MW USA is currently working with Rhoda Blough, Everence stewardship consultant, to provide financial webinars for MW USA beginning January 2020.
- MW USA attends the Constituency Leaders Council (CLC) gathering where conference and constituency groups reported on their connection with MC USA.

II. Next Steps

- Website. Our primary means of communication with constituents is through our website. Watch for our new interactive website that allows engagement in a timely manner and will enliven our communication and connection with the broader church.
- 2. Social Media. The focus will be on two social media platforms: Facebook and Instagram.
- 3. Fundraisers. We are working on fundraisers for MW USA in 2020:
 - a. Annual Golf outing, September 2020
 - b. 5k and 10k walk/runs at one or more women's retreats, 2020

III. Conclusion

I am encouraged by the many connections we are making with women and agencies within the Mennonite church. In addition to our faithful constituents, Mennonite Women USA is supported by pastors and leaders of the church. As we continue to live into our vision, these connections and others will become stronger. This is good for the church, but even more so for women and girls throughout the church.



COVID-19

The global health crisis has dominated all of our lives this Spring. Although our educational systems, both public and private, have been disrupted, our Anabaptist-Mennonite institutions have risen with grace to provide compassionate leadership. MEA's role during this crisis has been to provide support to the leaders of our schools, who are feeling the heavy burden of making tough decisions to close campuses and pivot to online learning. Although most schools are on summer break now, none are idle. Leaders and administrators are working hard to form plans, and contingency plans on top of contingency plans, seeking to balance safety with a sense of normalcy and community. We realize many leaders can feel isolated and high levels of stress, and the need for physical distancing only compounds this burden. **MEA staff stand ready to offer support** to our schools' leaders as they make difficult decisions and are challenged to discern new ways of being community together. Our prayers are with them. And as the pandemic persists and resurges in some locations, we all look to our Creator for help.

Mutual aid

One opportunity this crisis offers is the chance to **increase our mutual aid** to care for one another. Please encourage your congregations to support their students financially. There are congregational student aid plans and church-school matching programs, and congregations can give to schools using either a designated or unified giving plan. MEA can help congregations understand all of these options and develop plans of assistance for students, families and schools. If congregations already have student aid plans in place, please encourage them to consider an increased level of giving for each student.

New student loan options being explored with Everence

MEA is leading an exploratory conversation with Everence and Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary (AMBS) about new student loan options to ease financial strain for students and families. The idea is based on leveraging several unique players: congregations, individuals, AMBS, MEA and Everence. All would work together to develop a low-interest loan program for students. With AMBS as a

test plot, the goals would be to increase enrollment and provide additional leaders/pastors for Mennonite congregations. If successful, the program could be replicated at other schools. MEA is committed to advancing this conversation to help make Anabaptist-Mennonite education more affordable.

Legal resources

MEA provided three consultations by Zoom for our schools with an attorney to help understand the CARES Act and its provisions for unemployment claims and extended sick leave. Representatives across all levels of Mennonite education had the opportunity to ask questions and receive legal counsel specific to their contexts. This service was provided by MEA at no charge to the schools, utilizing the savings realized from canceled travel.

MEA Investment Fund focuses on climate change

The <u>MEA Investment Fund</u> Committee recently unveiled 5 new stewardship commitments that are focused on climate change. These commitments echo the Fund's intent to invest in companies that practice environment stewardship and work toward environment sustainability. Nine Mennonite education institutions from all levels of Mennonite education plus ten other MCUSA institutions with education-related funds participate in MEA's Investment Fund. More information about the five new climate change commitments can be found here.

New interim director for K-12 schools

Dawn Graber has been hard at work since beginning her role on a part-time basis four weeks ago. She enjoys tapping into her executive coaching skills set to connect with the principals and heads of schools, and she hopes to reach out to every school leader in the Mennonite Schools Council network in the coming weeks to offer support, encouragement and opportunities to collaborate. Already she has heard a call to provide a point of connection for affinity groups, such as music teachers and guidance counselors. These groups sometimes do not have others in similar roles at their own schools with whom they can share best practices, questions and ideas. Dawn was able to respond quickly to offer these affinity group meetings, and is also working to get up to speed on accreditation processes.

Hispanic Ministries Education

MEA's Hispanic Ministries Education programs are responding to the increasing demand for online training in theology and Biblical studies. MEA's **SeBAH** program, Seminario Bíblico Anabautista Hispano (Hispanic Anabaptist Biblical Seminary), offers 100% of its courses online and in Spanish, and students from many regions of the United States, Colombia and Mexico are enrolling. In the "Theology of Preaching" class that begins in July, 16 people from four Anabaptist organizations have enrolled. And in partnership with AMBS, SeBAH is offering a continuing education course this summer entitled, "Let's be church, from a radical Anabaptist perspective." To date, 20 people from the United States and other Latin American countries have registered. SeBAH and its sister program IBA, Instituto Bíblico Anabautista, (Anabaptist Biblical Institute) continue to lead the way on an international level to provide Spanishlanguage Biblical and theological education from an Anabaptist perspective.
