# From the former PNMC Moderator, Jeryl Hollinger

As I complete my time as PNMC moderator I am grateful for all the congregations and wonderful people of our conference who make up our life together. Serving as moderator has been a blessed gift to my life as I feel as though I've had a front row seat in the theater of God's people. And as we met on our Zoom Webinar for our annual meeting I sensed the energy of the Spirit flowing through the many friendships and visions we are fortunate to share. PNMC is certainly a gift to each one of us in whatever ways we participate.

In opening the delegate session on Zoom I observed that we were gathering "in a time of pandemic – in a time of racial injustice – in a time of partisan incivility – in a time of economic disparity - in a time of climate catastrophe, just to mention a few of the things we live with these days. But we also gather in a time when the church's message of Jesus is more relevant than ever – when our mission as followers of Jesus to be salt and light, to be voices and actors of redemption, and to be visionaries of justice and mercy is ever more needed. It is not always easy, but growth in Christ is seldom something that comes without becoming vulnerable and engaging in broader conversation. I encourage all of us to find ways to take advantage of the church-wide relationships that are available to us. There is a healing in it – something for which to be thankful. Sometimes as I have walked with others in the church, I feel like the leper on his way to the temple, covered in disease and scabs, when I suddenly realize God has been at work in my life and I am being healed, and I stop, turn back and rush to give thanks."

Thank you to PNMC for allowing me to be part of PNMC leadership for a time. I encourage others to take advantage of the opportunity to serve in PNMC roles as it arrives. Let us keep holding each others' hands.
