Albany Mennonite Church, *from Pastor Peter Epp*

I just read a comment that expressed fear for those of us who continue to have virtual worship services. "I fear you will be changed forever," the commenter wrote. I can sincerely appreciate the comment. When we switched to Zoom services, I had the same fear. But reading the comment also reminded me that those of us continuing to face that fear--continuing to stay virtual until everyone can come together safely--may have failed to heed the Gospel's call to share our testimonies.

To that end, here's my testimony, shared with joy and only to encourage those sincerely wrestling with the legitimate fear of being changed forever: Switching to Zoom services has been changing our church. Our sharing time has become more intimate, our love for each other has felt more tangible, and our awareness that the Spirit can work miracles in unexpected ways has grown profoundly. Somewhere in all the changes, God has shown us new things about ourselves. Things we weren't noticing before. Things that I can see becoming the foundation for our renewal. We recognize that our Zoom services don't work as well for some in church family as they do for others, and we long so, so much for the day when we can all safely return to worshipping together in person. In the meantime, though, we pray that when we do, we'll confirm that we have, indeed, been changed forever.

Pastor Peter reflected, "Though we continue to struggle with the disruptions of COVID-19, we also recognize that the move to virtual services has opened up an opportunity for us to visit sister congregations without travelling! We suspect that doing so will further connect us with others in the conference, allow us to see how you are meeting the challenges of this time in your place, and help us to remember that **we are part of a bigger picture with you.**"

Instead, the riders created a family friendly virtual bike ride with no minimum miles and a little competition. After three weeks, riders registered to win various prizes, such as oldest bike, most unusual item seen along the side of the road, and most miles on odometer. Members donated prizes of chocolate zucchini cake, homemade mustard, and movie tickets.
