New Beginnings...

PNMC is happy to welcome Emily Toews to her new role. Meet Menno Mennonite's new co-pastor: My name is Emily Toews, I am married to Bryce Miller and we co-pastor Menno Mennonite Church and co-parent Luke (5) and Anna (soon to be 4).

My family had a small orchard near Learnington, Ontario. I was baptized at North Learnington United Mennonite Church. Prior to pastoring, I attended CMU and the University of Manitoba and graduated with a BTh and a BEd. I first taught three years at the United Mennonite Educational Institute in Learnington, and then attended AMBS. I graduated from AMBS with an MDiv in 2006 and began my pastoral leadership journey at North Star Mennonite Church in Drake, Saskatchewan. I was there until 2015. Bryce and I married in 2014 and I became a stay at home mom in 2015 with the birth of Luke.

We've always been interested in Menno Mennonite Church - since Bryce was here as intern pastor in 2004. When Bryce's term at Jubilee Mennonite in Winnipeg came up for renewal, we knew Menno was looking for a pastor, so we applied - and here we are.

My journey here as co-pastor has not been easy. From the beginning we have been sloughing through bureaucratic immigration hoops. Last year the children and I had to move back to Canada and wait for movement on my visa file. What a hard 8 months of exile - topped with Covid-19 to make the separation even more painful and the process even more slow.



However, the kids and I returned for a 6 month visit in September and in December my religious non-immigrant worker visa was approved and I am now working. We are still engaged in working for my green-card, but with the pandemic, everything is much more complicated. Please join us in praying for Emily's transition and remaining immigration process to go smoothly.

2021 Conference Communications Council, A Reflection by Jennifer Delanty

The 2021 CCC brought many wonderful, new and familiar faces to our individual screens via Zoom. After Moderator Dianna Eshleman welcomed the participants, Katherine Jameson Pitts provided an update about our congregations endeavoring to "hold the center" amidst this pandemic. Professor Safwat Marzouk from AMBS engaged the gathering in a spirited presentation about what it means to be God's people in this time of chaos and disorientation. Noting the Bible is a text telling the stories of migrants, sojourners and exiles throughout the diaspora, Professor Marzouk focused on the story of Joseph, who was forced to flee to Egypt.

Professor Marzouk noted that God is a migrant as well, traveling with those going into exile. What do we experience together with migrants who come to live amongst people already settled? What do we experience of God together? Re-settled in Egypt, Joseph and Pharaoh, two wholly different people, experienced a deep encounter of seeing God in each other. Likewise, we are formed and transformed in the presence of each other, blessed by God in these encounters.

Professor Marzouk encouraged us to not assume a monolithic narrative in our church spaces. He asked us to remember we have an ethical commitment to the marginalized. Remember our Anabaptist martyrdom to inform our empathy for the other; hearing stories of resilience of people God brings to us is deeply transformative. An invitation for dismantling injustice provides an opportunity to use our power for advocating for and seeing others as fellow spiritual beings. Recognizing that God is present in the midst of alienation and dislocation also helps us understand the "us vs. them" impact that has been so detrimental to our society and collective well-being. Finally, Professor Marzouk challenged us of the settled, white majority to deeply consider what it means to be an ally in a society that names non-white people as "other" and accordingly stratifies privilege and opportunity.

Representatives from our 30+ congregations next took turns sharing their blessings and challenges in their settings. We are grateful for PNMC leaders planning this gathering amidst pandemic restrictions. As always, it was a blessing to listen, learn, and pray together.

Salem Mennonite Church

They sleep under bridges, live in cars and camp in parks. They are victims for various reasons - abuse, addiction, mental illness, prison release, and poverty. They all have one thing in common - the lack of an adequate home. About 1200 Salem residents are designated as homeless. Many are served by Church @ the Park. The founding mission of this small outreach church is to serve the homeless. After working on the sock project and providing cookies for the 12 Days of Christmas project, SMC is now supporting Church @ the Park's mission by providing a meal the fourth Thursday for at least six months. This is one way we can follow the message of Matthew 25:35-40, "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat."




