### Albany Mennonite Church

Together we are remembering the legacy of [David Mann](#). David passed away on December 13, 2021. He was called to serve as pastor of Albany Mennonite Church in 1955 and served the congregation for 15 years. During this time David worked in various capacities in the Pacific Coast Mennonite Conference, as well as in leadership of the Oregon Mennonite Camping Association, which established Drift Creek Camp. He also served on the Overseas Committee and Board of Directors of Mennonite Board of Missions. David was ordained to the ministry in Albany on July 8, 1956. He, his father and brother-in-law, J. Alton Horst, were all ordained within a three month time. On June 5, 1960 he was ordained as a bishop and subsequently served in this capacity with the Albany, Logsdan, Lebanon, Eugene and Corvallis congregations. During his years in Oregon, he and his wife, Mona, were blessed with three children, David Michael, Timothy Wade and Jeanne Marie. Twins, Stephen Kent and Thomas Brent, died at birth in January 1961. In 1970 the family moved to Elkhart, IN while David continued his studies toward an MDiv degree at Goshen Biblical Seminary and he served half-time as Director of Church Relations for the Seminary. David is survived by his wife, Mona, and their three children. A memorial service is scheduled for **April 30th** at Trinity Mennonite Church in Glendale, AZ, where former AMC Pastor, Megan Good, will officiate. ### Mountain View Mennonite Church — *A personal reflection from Jeryl Hollinger*

Growing up in a community that had very little racial diversity, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was viewed as a troublemaker. In those days I had very little understanding of the subversive nature of racism and how it affects every aspect of society. The more experiences I've had in interracial settings, reading resources, and paying attention, I've gradually had my own awakening to the seriousness of racism all around me and inside me. As we come again this weekend to the remembrance of King and his **relentless light shining into our dark places**, my concern and prayer is that our society can find a way to face our failures with wisdom and fortitude. The welfare of our future depends on it.

*You give us prophets, holy God, to cry out for justice and mercy. Open our ears to hear them, and to follow the truth they speak, lest we support injustice to secure our own well-being.*

The local annual Martin Luther King Jr. program has become for our congregation synonymous with our **traveling peace quilt peacemaker-of-the-year award**. Since 2013 we have looked around our community each year for those who are making a positive contribution to peace among us. This award has become a public testimony of our congregation's commitment to the shalom of God we pray guides our living together. But once again this year, due to COVID and some other factors, no public program is being planned. Our award will be given in a much more private setting, our witness somewhat diluted.

The world could not handle Dr. King. Light is a threat to secrets. Cries are disturbing to the comfortable. As his witness grew, he saw the fingers of racism in poverty and war. For many, his knife of justice was cutting too deeply into the fabric of complacency. He joined the company of those who were silenced. The cost of speaking up for justice is real. Not many are willing to travel that path. Our award looks for those who stay true to the vision in spite of the apathy or obstacles around them. And I trust our own walk with God as a congregation will continue to move us toward that vision as well.

### Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary

AMBS offers five graduate-level degree and certificate programs as well as a wide variety of non-degree educational options to **help students grow in faith and strengthen their leadership gifts**. Our faculty members are experienced scholars and mentors, seeking to empower students for a continuous encounter with God and for creative Christian leadership.

~The [Multicultural Church Scholarship](#) is for students who are serving in or preparing for ministry assignments in a multicultural context and/or who belong to historically underrepresented racial or ethnic groups within the Mennonite Church. Both full- and part-time students who are beginning a master's program can apply.

~The [MDiv Connect Student Scholarship](#) is for students who are beginning the distance-friendly [Master of Divinity \(MDiv\) Connect](#) program and who are affiliated with Mennonite World Conference or a related Anabaptist group.

~The [Ecumenical Student Scholarship](#) supports students from other-than-Anabaptist Christian traditions who want to engage with people from the Anabaptist tradition while sharing the theological perspectives of and growing in their own tradition. Both full- and part-time students who are beginning a master's program can apply.

The application deadline is **March 15**. Applicants must have been admitted to AMBS by that date to be considered for scholarships, so starting the [admissions application process](#) as soon as possible is recommended. If you're on the fence, consider attending the [Seminary Preview Webinar](#) on **Tuesday, Jan. 25, 8–8:45 p.m. EST**, to learn about what AMBS has to offer.
