Salem Mennonite Church, A Reflection by Jerrell Williams

Hello friends! Back in February, I had the opportunity to attend the Hope for the Future Conference hosted by MC USA in Atlanta, GA. Hope for the Future is a denominational gathering for Mennonites of color. Every year I mark this event on my calendar. It is a great opportunity to connect and find rest with folks who understand the struggles that BIPOC folks face in the Mennonite church.

This year our theme was "Such a Time as This" which was from the book of Esther. We worshiped together, ate together, and learned together. **Dr. Wilma Baily** led us in Bible studies and we had dynamic speakers for our worship sessions. As mentioned, this always means a lot to me because it is when I feel the most connected to the Mennonite church. I'm in a unique position. Not only am I ordained in a predominately white denomination, but I am also the pastor of a predominately white congregation.

While I love my church and the support that they give, it is refreshing to connect with other BIPOC Mennonites. The first time I attended Hope for the Future, I was on the fence about joining the Mennonite church. I enjoyed the theology, but I didn't know if I actually fit in. I didn't have the right last name. I didn't grow up in the church. My introduction to Mennonites was at Bethel College and they were okay, but it did not seem like the tradition for me. This changed when I attended the Hope for the Future Conference in 2018. The love and support that I felt from those in attendance who had a similar experience and journey as my own led me to realize that the Mennonite church was where I wanted to be.

I had a similar experience this year. I again felt a connection as I saw some new faces and embraced old friends. This year, in particular, was unique because we took time to both honor our elders who have paved the way for us and we also welcomed the younger generation to their first conference. Hope for the Future is a great time of love, connection, and support. I am grateful for Salem Mennonite Church for providing financial support for me to attend. I am grateful for those within MC USA who opened the door for diversity within the denomination. I am grateful for my BIPOC siblings who walk alongside me in sharing the God's peace within our communities.

West Coast Mennonite Central Committee

West Coast MCC remodeled their 100-year old building in Reedley, CA to create the MCC Global Center, with a grand opening on February 24, 2023. The "new" community center has an immigration office; will host school children learning about the world and making kits; comforter and quilt days with local residents; volunteer options; and community events. The space is striking with murals and bright colors and paintings and fabric from around the world, representing MCC partners and history. A coffee bar in the corner offers fair-trade coffee from an MCC partner in México.



The WCMCC board recently met and reviewed programs and opportunities. The Restorative Justice program in Phoenix, AZ is thriving with requests for education in multiple organizations and school systems. The recently hired trauma chaplain has walked with families in the immigration process. MCC staff, from other parts of the US, will be participating in a Borderlands Tour near Tucson, AZ to learn how to expand education across the country. The staff members working on immigration services, stay nimble responding to national regulatory changes.

Our new PNMC Representatives are Twila Lehman (Albany) and Nelly Ascencio (Ministerios Restauración). They both bring a strong background of familiarity with MCC, PNMC, and board experience. Other board members from the PNMC conference are board appointees Kiara Yoder (Zion) and Nancy Chupp (Seattle).
