
Farewell as Moderator

Boers is the author of "Day by Day These Things We Pray: an Anabaptist Prayer Book," "The Way is Made by Walking," and "Living into Focus," among other titles. In his new book, a memoir ("Shattered: A Son Picks up the Pieces of His Father's Rage"), Boers depicts his upbringing in a Dutch Reformed immigrant community in Ontario, Canada and grapples with the family violence stemming from the generational trauma of the Nazi occupation of Holland alongside his burgeoning call to ministry and evolving understanding of faith and theology.

Pacific Northwest Mennonite Historical Society

In August of 1914, World War I began and continued until 1918. When the United States entered the war during 1917, many young men were drafted into the military services, including many from the Mennonites, Quakers, Brethren and others who were conscientious objectors.

In 2014, the remembrance of a century since the war began was marked by Kauffman Museum, a part of Bethel College of North Newton, KS. Museum staff created a travelling exhibition entitled "Voices of Conscience." Since that time, the exhibition has been taken to colleges and communities throughout the Midwest. It received a national award for its creative approach remembering the experience of World War I conscious objectors.

The Pacific Northwest Mennonite Historical Society has arranged to bring "Voices of Conscience" to Portland, OR. Lewis & Clark College has agreed to give lobby space for the exhibition from July 28 to September 24, 2023 at the Watzek Library. This will give many students and members of the wider community opportunities to view the exhibit and learn of the experiences of conscious objectors during the war.

Our agreement with Kauffman Museum calls for a fee of \$5,000 plus \$3,000 for transportation and setup of the exhibition. PNMC agreed to support the project with a grant of \$4000. Members of the society and the Board of Directors have contributed \$2,500 towards the project. PNMHS feels that this exhibition will help meet its mission to educate the public and provide information about an important time in the history of our Mennonite community. Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary

AMBS is launching a new Practical Leadership Training program to help pastors, lay leaders, community leaders and leaders of nonprofit organizations increase their capacity to provide effective Anabaptist leadership in a variety of settings. The program grew out of a listening process in which church leaders shared that they needed practical leadership skills to meet challenges resulting from the pandemic, polarization, shifting church commitments and an unpredictable future. In response, AMBS designed a program consisting of modules focusing on four areas: administration, leadership, contextual engagement and well-being.

"We're hearing from leaders across the church that formation in practical skills in these four areas is most needed in our time and will very beneficial for leaders' groundwork," said **Luis Tapia Rubio**, MDiv, who directs the new program. To learn more, click here.
