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## A Reflection for Holy Week Listening for the Beating Heart of God

When John tells the story of Jesus's last night with his disciples, there is a small verse that follows the account of Jesus washing the disciples' feet:

One of his disciples—the one whom Jesus loved was reclining next to him . . . JOHN 13:23 (NRSV)

Although this "beloved disciple" is mentioned more than once in the fourth gospel, they are never identified by name. Tradition has held that it was John the Evangelist, the writer of this gospel. Others have suggested that the beloved one was Mary Madgalene; a possibility that has been strengthened by more recent and compelling scholarship around Mary Magdalene in the Gospel of John.

Whether it was John, Mary Magdalene, or one of the other disciples, I invite you to consider the intimate, corporeal reality of this moment; a reality that the King James Version makes even more explicit with the words: "Now there was leaning on Jesus' bosom one of his disciples, whom Jesus loved." There, tradition says, with an ear to Jesus' chest, the disciple heard the heartbeat of God.

In Holy Week we recall this and other moments of those final days Jesus shared with his friends. Our remembering might simply amount to a recounting, a detached recollection of what happened long ago, hoping to squeeze from it some nectar of inspiration to sustain our faith. It is also possible for it to be much, much more than this.

It is possible for Holy Week to bring a re-membering, a rejoining of our whole lives—heart, mind, body and soul—with the selfemptying and ever-creating effulgence of God's love in Christ. It is possible to remember that the passion and resurrection of Jesus were not moments that happened at one time; they are unfolding, emergent realities in and through all time. We know and see around us the suffering and dying of Jesus in this tragically broken world. We also experience and know the rising and the rebirthing of Love in and through our bodies, in and through our common life, and shining through the whole of creation.

I invite you to consider praying with the image of you, yourself, being that beloved disciple. Imagine laying your weary head on the chest of Jesus and feeling there a great warmth in this cold world. Imagine feeling such welcome, mercy and acceptance in his tender embrace. Imagine sensing a slight rhythmic vibration against your face—as sensation, as sound—and realizing it is a beating heart. Know that this heart beats for you with a love that is fierce and has no end. Know that this heart beats within you, summoning you into a noisy world with a guiding cadence that can be trusted, whatever may come.

Portland Mennonite Church



On February 25, Portland Mennonite Church was glad to welcome Sarah Augustine. Sarah's latest book, co-authored with Sheri Hostetler, is titled So We and Our Children May Live: Following Jesus in Confronting the Climate Crisis (Herald Press). Sarah preached in the morning worship service. Drawing on the lectionary texts for the Second Sunday in Lent, she spoke of the ways the biblical notion of 'covenant' (Genesis 17) has been transformed into a malevolent theology of conquest that legitimizes the Doctrine of Discovery. She also called us to the kind of radical discipleship (Mark 8) that resists the deathly ways of our extractive economic system. She ended with the challenge to 'choose life' (Deuteronomy 30). In a Forum that followed, the congregation had a chance to further explore Sarah's book. The authors clearly describe the devastating impacts of the extractive economy, particularly on indigenous communities. They make the case that solutions to climate change can't come through the same systems that created it. And they admonish us to look to indigenous communities for wisdom about alternative responses. In the Forum, Sarah made the case that it starts with a fundamental re-thinking of the core assumptions our system makes. Rather than prioritizing individuals and profit-making, we must prioritize communities and mutual well-being. Sarah speaks with a prophetic voice calling us back to the Reality that God intends for all creation.
