Nourished by the Words

Your words were found, and I ate them, and your words became to me a joy and the delight of my heart; for I am called by your name, O Lord. JEREMIAH 15:16

The Holy Scriptures I consider above every human treasure, but not so high as the Word of God which is living, powerful, and eternal, for it is God Himself, Spirit and no letter, written without pen or paper so that it can never be destroyed. -HANS DENCK, 16th century Anabaptist reformer

Notice Jeremiah's visceral language. The words of God are tasted, consumed and enfleshed, like a rich and hearty meal that delights the heart, mind, body and spirit. The prophet keeps it real, as any worthwhile prophet does, reminding us of the manifest presence of God; or, as a later prophet-poet, Gerard Manley Hopkins, put it: "the world is charged with the grandeur of God."

This includes you, and me, and the next person you meet. *We* are charged with the grandeur of God. We are in and of this world and, as such, we are the words of God enfleshed, just as God's words are made manifest within all of creation. There is nowhere we can go where God's words are not already being uttered in some way that might nourish our joy. We carry God's word in the depths of our hearts.

Hans Denck, a 16th century reformer who had close ties with the Anabaptist founders of our Mennonite lineage of faith, spoke of this as "the Inward Word of God." He described it as the greatest treasure we carry as followers of Jesus. I believe that the hope of the church right now rests in our willingness to listen to and reclaim this prophetic, transforming wisdom of the Inward Word; the living, nourishing presence of God within us and among us—within and among *all*.

Our religious practices, theologies and doctrines in the church have too often made God's activity and presence seem like second hand news. People are longing for firsthand encounter and experience. We long for it because something in us—at the deepest, most fleshy and soulful level— knows it is our birthright. The longing and desire for living encounter with God *is* the Inward Word already resounding within us.

May we hear it in the depths of our listening hearts. May we hear it sounding forth in one another and celebrate its unique expression in our neighbors. May we hear it harmonizing in the ground, the flowing waters, the air we breathe, and all the life with which we share life. May we eat these living words, be nourished by them, and know that we are part of a great and transforming composition of Love!
