# **2025 Conference Communications Council**

On Saturday, February 1, more than seventy people representing 21 of our 24 congregations in PNMC joined on Zoom for our annual Conference Communications Council (CCC), "The Transforming Church: Anabaptism at 500." It was a rich and inspiring time of worship, learning, resourcing and reflecting.



Worship included a readers theater, written by **Stephen Penner** (Salem Mennonite Church), reflecting on how we remember our history and practice our faith today as Anabaptist Christians. **Roger Piper-Ruth** (Hyde Park Mennonite Fellowship) led us in an original song from a musical he composed on the roots of Anabaptism.

Our presenters offered challenging insights on what it means to connect with the fullness of our story as a people of faith, and how we are together called to be a vital and creative expression of the Body of Christ today. **Olivia Krall**, Mennonite Church USA Archivist, shared the stories of two mid-20<sup>th</sup> century Mennonite women, Mary Emma Showalter and Rowena Larke, who helped shape the rapidly changing church of their times. Historian and author, **John D. Roth**, shared about the making of the recently published *Anabaptist Community Bible*,

and other resources available from MennoMedia in commemoration of the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Finally, **Lin Rush**, current board president for the Pacific Northwest Mennonite Historical Society (PNMHS), offered valuable insights about ways our congregations can retain our records and contribute to gathering the stories of today's church for the sake of future generations.

Our final hour was led by **Chris Nord,** PNMC Moderator, and members of the PNMC Board. We were reminded of the current fiscal challenges faced by the conference, and Board members encouraged and invited congregations and individuals to join in the continued financial support of our PNMC community. We are so grateful for the generous support of many! Thank you!

I am grateful for the way the Holy Spirit lives and moves and connects us, across time and place. Even a "virtual meeting" like we held on Saturday is no barrier! As we all know, though, there is nothing like actually being together! What does it mean to provide sanctuary for undocumented people? This webinar will feature several pastors whose congregations have previously served as sanctuaries. Lawyers from the Institute of Constitutional Advocacy and Protection will discuss the legal issues related to sanctuary, specifically focusing on section 1324, and will allow time for participants to ask questions. For churches that are currently working with or are interested in supporting undocumented individuals in their communities, this webinar will provide crucial information on what to expect and what legal assistance is available if your church faces challenges from ICE or immigration agents. Steve grew up in the Church of the Nazarene and considered it home for so long. That heritage is valuable to me, and I am grateful for those who taught me how to read Scripture, encouraged my discipleship, called out gifts for ministry and empowered me to lead at a young age. I remember a time, while working on my undergraduate degree, when I was working to identify why the Nazarene denomination would continue to be my home.
